


A vigorous francophone culture

A PLACE TO THRIVE

Sudbury offers numerous opportunities for personal growth, including many museums, the world-class Science North education centre and various other resources. Registration for a variety of French and English as a second language courses is also available.

Sudbury is home to three post-secondary educational institutions (one university and two colleges), making it possible to pursue a post-secondary education without needing to move to a different city once secondary school is over.

CSCNO schools wants every student to take full advantage of the academic experience. In addition to the coursework they need to earn their credits, students are encouraged to take part in special programs and extracurricular activities.

CO-OP

The cooperative education program (CO-OP) enables students to gain practical experience in an area of interest to them even as they earn secondary school credits. Cooperative education also helps build a network of professional contacts and access resources that are unavailable at the school. Please note: the CO-OP option is only available for students in grades 11 and 12.

SPECIALIST HIGH SKILLS MAJORS

Specialist High Skills Majors let you focus your studies on a specific sector of economic activity and learn about a career in that area. The Specialist High Skills Major option is only available to students who choose "Academic Adventure" and finish grades 11 and 12 at a CSCNO school. However, even students who do not

finish their Specialist High Skills Major can take advantage of some of its features that are available in their school. Among the benefits of a Specialist High Skills Major are the following:

- Tailor your secondary school education to your interests, talents and professional ambitions
- Earn credits that are recognized by post secondary educational institutions and by the employment sector
- Receive certifications that are recognized by the employment sector through career-oriented training
- Develop essential skills and work habits that are documented in the Ontario Skills Passport

DYNAMIC AND PERFORMING SECONDARY SCHOOLS

École secondaire catholique Champlain

École secondaire catholique Champlain is located in the community of **Chelmsford**, whose 15,000 residents live approximately 20 km from Sudbury. School enrolment is 225, and teaching staff numbers 25. This school stands out in its integration of digital age tools at all levels of learning and its STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts and Mathematics) approach that ensures student commitment, growth and excellence as they develop world-class skills. Higher grade students also have access to Specialist High Skills Majors in mining or in health and welfare, which include professional certifications, co-op workplace internships and other experience-based learning opportunities.

Collège Notre-Dame

Located in downtown **Sudbury**, Collège Notre-Dame (CND) is the largest CSCNO secondary school, with an enrolment of 600 students and a teaching staff of 50. Collège Notre-Dame uses a trimester academic schedule, which means that its students take the same courses from September to June. That is an advantage for international students, since it makes it easier for them to adapt to their school before needing to think about exams. CND provides opportunities for science and math enrichment, as well as a widely acknowledged arts program. Collège Notre-Dame students may enrol in Specialist High Skills Majors in business or sports.



École secondaire catholique l'Horizon

Located in the community of **Val Caron**, École secondaire catholique l'Horizon is welcoming, friendly and safe. The school's dynamic teaching staff of 35 is committed to the success of each and every one of its 450 students. Horizon offers a wide variety of course choices and leadership training opportunities that include Specialist High Skills Majors in health and welfare or mining as well as courses in building and transportation technology, hairstyling and beauty. The school also has a proven sports achievement record, both regionally and provincially, as well as a recognized music program.

École secondaire du Sacré-Cœur

École secondaire du Sacré-Cœur is also located in the centre of **Sudbury**. It has an enrolment of 225 students and a teaching staff of 30. While students have access to a varied choice of courses and a technology and carpentry workshop, they can also sign up for a Specialist High Skills Major in health and welfare or in justice, community security and emergency services. This school is committed to promoting indigenous culture and encourages its students to learn about the various cultures of the people of Canada's First Nations.

Academic Adventure

Academic Adventure is the ideal choice for students with good spoken and written French skills and who want to take the same courses as Ontario francophone students. This stream can eventually lead to an Ontario Secondary School Diploma (OSSD) and to admission to a post-secondary college or university program in Canada.

Canadian Adventure

Students in the Canadian Adventure stream become more familiar with the French language as they experience Canadian life. Individual academic schedules are personalized on the basis of their interests and skills. It includes fewer academic courses in French than what Ontario Francophone students take in order to help improve French language skills as academic success is achieved. This program can also serve as preparation for the Academic Adventure stream, which requires a higher level of French skills.

Summer Adventure

Summer Adventure takes place in the setting of 2- or 4-week cultural and language summer camp for teenagers between the ages of 13 and 17. It is the ideal choice for students who want to discover Canada while practising their French and English language skills. Summer Adventure is an excellent way to discover the most interesting tourism sites in Greater Sudbury and Northern Ontario in a friendly atmosphere. It also opens the way for students who would like to experience longer stays in the area.
